Salman to produce ₹300 cr film on Sikh hero

Actor Salman Khan, 50, who has produced films such as Hero (2015) and Bajirao Bhaijaan (2015) under his production banners, will collaborate with Toronto-based Indian businessman Ajay Virmani to make a historical film, Lions Of The Sea. The project is based on the celebrated 1914 incident when the Japanese ship Kamagata Maru sailed with over 349 Sikh passengers to Canada, but was denied entry.

Actor Irrfan Khan will star as the Sikh lawyer Gurdit Singh, who fought for the Kamagata Maru passengers' right to enter Canada.

"It's an honour to partner with Salman to ensure this historic story, which has challenged many racial laws in the western world is finally told. The issues of racial acceptance and due processes are at the heart of the story and continue to be relevant in today's world," says Ajay Virmani. The project is estimated to be made on a budget of ₹300 crores.

"We were pleased and humbled that the Honourable Prime Minister Justin Trudeau earlier this year recognised and apologised in the House of Commons for the unjust treatment committed against these migrants. We're excited to announce this production will commence in 2017 as we celebrate Canada, its diversity as well as its 150th anniversary," he adds.

Delhiites resort to air purifiers in a bid to tackle pollution

The smog may seem normal now, but the air quality in the city is still a cause of concern. "If anybody need some cash in and around South Delhi, you can message me, I can help you out, believe me I know the struggle (sic)," read a Facebook post by Pankaj Upadhyay. "If you're stuck in an emergency and need cash for medicines in Gurgaon? I would be happy to help!," tweeted Abhishek Tripathi. Anish Sharma, a city resident shares: "I had

withdrawn ₹2500 but didn't feel the need in the past five days. So, I offered a sum of ₹200 to 10 people." And this is encouraging many more. "I saw people offering help. So I, too, offered 23 notes of ₹100 each to those who needed it urgently. In Sector 40 market, I saw senior citizens struggling to exchange their notes. So I gave them cash, in exchange of their old ₹500 and ₹1,000 notes," says Aditya Dariya, a corporate from Gurgaon. Here's someone who received help. "I was moving to Delhi from Chandigarh and I had no cash with me. I posted about this on a help group on Facebook, and a gentleman gave me ₹4,000 in cash. I transferred the amount online to his account. It's great to see that people you don't even know are helping each other," says chef Richa Johri.
